


National Qualifications explained

National Qualifications (NQs) – almost everyone leaving school or college has one or more NQs. These are secondary school and college qualifications (and some training centres).

National 3

National 3 courses are **made up of units which are assessed as pass or fail** by the teacher. These Units require learners to develop:

- basic knowledge and understanding of the subject
- apply skills to a range of simple tasks in familiar contexts, with guidance from teachers. Learners need to pass all units to achieve the qualification.

National 4

National 4 courses are **made up of units**, including an added value unit which assesses learners' performance across the course.

The units are **assessed as pass or fail** by the teacher and learners need to pass all units, including the added value unit, to achieve the qualification.

National 5

National 5 courses are generally taken in secondary schools (S4-S6) and in further education colleges.

National 5 courses are assessed through a question paper (exam) or coursework, or both - most of which will be marked by SQA. In some subjects, coursework is marked by a teacher. **The courses are graded A to D or 'no award'.**



Higher

Highers are generally taken in secondary schools (S5-S6) and in further education colleges.

The course assessment involves a question paper (exam) or coursework, or both - most of which are marked by SQA. In some subjects, coursework is marked by a teacher.

The courses are graded A to D or 'no award'.

Some learners leave secondary education with Highers and progress to further/higher education, training or employment.

Highers are the standard entry requirements for higher education in Scotland.

Advanced Higher

Advanced Highers are generally taken in secondary schools (S5-S6) and in further education colleges.

The course assessment involves a question paper (exam) or coursework, or both - most of which will be marked by SQA. In some subjects, coursework is marked by a teacher.

The courses are graded A to D or 'no award'.

They provide good preparation for learners progressing to further and higher education.



Baccalaureates

The Baccalaureates in Expressive Arts, Languages, Science and Social Sciences (all at level 7) consists on a coherent group of current Higher and Advanced Higher Qualifications.

We generally work within L5, L6 and at times L7. This will include any courses at West Lothian College too.



National Certificates (NCs)

National Certificates prepare people for employment, career development or progression to more advanced study at HNC/HND level.

They also develop transferable knowledge including Core Skills.

These certificates are aimed at 16-18 year olds or adults in full-time education and are at SCQF Levels 2-6. Each one is specific to a subject or occupational area.

There are NCs in subjects as diverse as Sound Production, Technical Theatre and Child, Health and Social Care.

National Progression Awards



National Progression Awards (NPAs) are available in a variety of sectors, from Construction and Childcare to areas such as Digital Literacy and Social Software.

They're aimed at assessing a defined set of skills and knowledge in specialist areas. They also link to National Occupational Standards, which are the basis of SVQs.

NPAs are at SCQF Levels 2-6 and are delivered in partnership between schools, colleges and employers. Although many schools get involved, they're mainly used by colleges for short-

Higher National Qualifications

HNC and HND courses provide the practical skills you need to do a job and the theoretical knowledge your employer will expect you to have.

All the courses are made up of Higher National Units.

- HNCs usually take one year to complete.
- HNDs usually take two years to complete.
- Some HNCs allow direct entry into the second year of a degree programme, and some HNDs allow direct entry to third year

Foundation Apprenticeships

Foundation Apprenticeships are a **work-based learning opportunity** for senior-phase secondary school pupils.

Lasting one or two years, pupils begin their Foundation Apprenticeship in S5 or S6. Young people spend time out of school at college or with a local employer, and complete the Foundation Apprenticeship alongside their other subjects like National 5s and Highers. Completion leads to a qualification at the same level of learning as a Higher and can lead to progression on to a job, such as a Modern or Graduate Apprenticeship.

Foundation Apprenticeships are recognised as entry qualifications by all Scottish colleges and universities.

The Hayward Review and National Discussion on Education

On 31 May the Scottish Government published **All Learners in Scotland Matter**, the final report of the National Discussion on Education, facilitated by Professor Carol Campbell and Professor Alma Harris. This report outlines the Vision, Values and Call to Action for the future direction of Scottish education.

On 22 June the Scottish Government published It's **Our Future**, the final report of the **Independent Review of Qualifications and Assessment** which was led by Professor Louise Hayward.

Recommendations in this report centre around the introduction of a **Scottish Diploma of Achievement (SDA) in the Senior Phase, with three mandatory elements: Personal Pathway, Programmes of Learning and Project Learning.**
